

Tuesday 26th September was EDL. Students were able to participate in a number of quizzes during tutor time to celebrate the number of languages spoken in Europe. Hannah Coward spent one week in Barcelona in June 2O23 working in a school. She found it interesting to learn about a different school system. The experience helped to improve her Spanish as she had to speak to younger children who could not communicate in English. In addition, she really enjoyed it because after a few she started understanding Catalonian, too.

Pearl Erskine participated in a work and study abroad experience. This means she spent one week in Valencia not only working in a nursery, but also attended Spanish lessons organised by the company. She stayed with a host family and the company organised activities in the evening such as cooking Fidegua (a traditional dish in Valencia) and touring the city. Pearl thinks that this experience was really good to help her improve her confidence and it was nice to get to know other people from other countries who were also learning Spanish.

Sam Curry completed one week in Lille, France, last April. She worked in a hotel and found it was really fun working behind reception, as well as the breakfast and housekeeping teams. She would recommend it to other students as it would help them improve their language skills in a more casual way. Sam travelled and stayed in a flat with other British students of the same age. She said it was fun spending a week in a foreign country and exploring. Although the idea of carrying out work experience abroad can be nerve racking, she felt that she understood more than she thought she would.

Natalie Thomas went to Lille and worked at a Bowling Alley and lived with a host family for a week. She had an amazing week and loved that she got to speak French every day, massively grew in confidence and had to be an adult; - getting herself from A-B and working out bus and metro times etc. She highly encourages people to go for it and to stay with a host family too!

Agatha Lovell worked at a school outside Paris and organised this herself. She stayed with her aunt and gained a lot linguistically during her time in France. She was also able to visit various places while there.
