Psychology Behind Bars

On Tuesday 7th November our year 13 Psychology students took a trip to the Birmingham and Midland Institute to attend a 'Behind Bars' conference presented by True Life Conferences. During the day, students had the opportunity to explore what an ideal prison would be and the forms of punishment and rehabilitation that are offered to offenders. They also got to hear from and question four ex offenders about the crimes they had committed and their experiences in the prison system. The day was extremely interesting and the students were able to take much of what they had learnt in the classroom and apply it to the lives of the offenders.

The Psychology Department is also very excited for an upcoming visit by a Clinical Psychologist on Thursday 23rd November. Year 13 students will have the opportunity to hear about the profession and ask questions to gain further insight into the working world of the subject.



Year 11 Holocaust AI Session

The news has been full of the potential benefits and risks of AI technology recently. In October a group of our Year II students were lucky enough to trial some new technology being developed by the Holocaust Educational Trust.

Through the use of AI technology, students were able to interact with a Holocaust survivor, framing their own questions to explore their life story. Sadly, as the number of survivors diminishes, the need to record the testimonies of those involved in the Holocaust becomes more and more important. Students also had the chance to experience sites associated with the survivor's story through the use of Virtual Reality headsets. This was a fantastic opportunity for both staff and students and is a clear example of how cutting edge technology could transform the way students learn about the Holocaust in the future.

AGS was lucky enough to be offered a free trial of the programme which is not yet available to schools; the Holocaust Educational Trust is hoping to extend this programme across the country at some time during 2O24.

Following a successful Y13 Gold Assessed expedition and the Y12 Gold training walk, the majority of Bronze, Silver and Gold DofE enrolments have now been processed with accounts created on eDofE.

Students now need to ...

- Download the eDofE app or access their eDofE accounts online
- Login to their eDofE accounts
- Enter / update their personal information and contact details
- Choose the timescales of their activities
- Enter the details of their volunteering, physical and skills activities ensuring the activity meets the DofE criteria for that section. Enrolment dates were set as 13th September for Bronze and Silver so students can use that date as their start date for their activities. This date can be moved back to 1st September but students will need to email <u>a.jervis@alcestergs.com</u> to request this date change.
- Get on with the activities ensuring that they complete an average of 1 hour per week per activity for the full duration of the activity i.e. the first and last hour are at least 3, 6, 12 or 18 months apart. It is worth keeping an <u>activity log</u> to keep track of the hours.
- Bronze and Silver participants should aim to have one section fully completed with an assessor report uploaded to eDofE by Monday 19th February. This is an interim deadline to try to ensure that students are 'on track' to complete their award as soon as they have completed their assessed expedition.

Room details are TBC based on student numbers, but the lecture will be hosted in school.


SPARX Maths notice




