# Safeguarding Spotlight: County Lines and Criminal Exploitation

## What is County Lines?

County Lines is when criminal gangs move illegal drugs from cities into smaller towns and rural areas. They use special mobile phone numbers, called “deal lines”, to take orders and tell people where to deliver drugs or they use social media.

These gangs often exploit children and vulnerable adults to carry drugs and money. This helps gangs make more profit while avoiding getting caught. Many young people do not realise they are being exploited, or they feel trapped and afraid to leave.

## What is Exploitation?

Exploitation happens when gangs trick, pressure, or threaten people into doing illegal things. They may offer:

- Money, drugs, or clothes
- Friendship, attention, or protection

Gangs may also use violence and threats to control people. Those involved are at risk of harm, drug use, violence, sexual exploitation, and modern slavery.

## Who is most at risk?

Anyone can be targeted, but children aged 15–17 are most at risk.

Risk factors include:

- Poverty or homelessness
- Unsafe or unstable home life
- Disabilities or mental health problems
- Drug or alcohol use
- Being in care or excluded from school
- Past contact with crime

Some children from stable homes are also targeted because gangs think they are less likely to be caught.





# Safeguarding Spotlight: County Lines and Criminal Exploitation

## Use of Social Media

Gangs often recruit through social media by:

- Advertising drugs with photos and videos
- Showing money or drugs in posts
- Using emojis as code  
(e.g. ❄️ for cocaine 🚀 for strong drugs)



Recruitment can happen online or face to face.

## Signs in your area

Possible warning signs include:

- Lots of visitors at a home, especially late at night
- New or changing residents
- Young people travelling with unknown adults
- Strong or unusual smells
- People seeming scared, secretive, or withdrawn

## Signs someone may be involved

Look out for:

- Going missing from home or school
- New phones, money, or expensive items
- Lots of calls or messages, being very secretive
- Sudden changes in mood or behaviour
- Injuries with no clear reason
- Dropping out of school or work

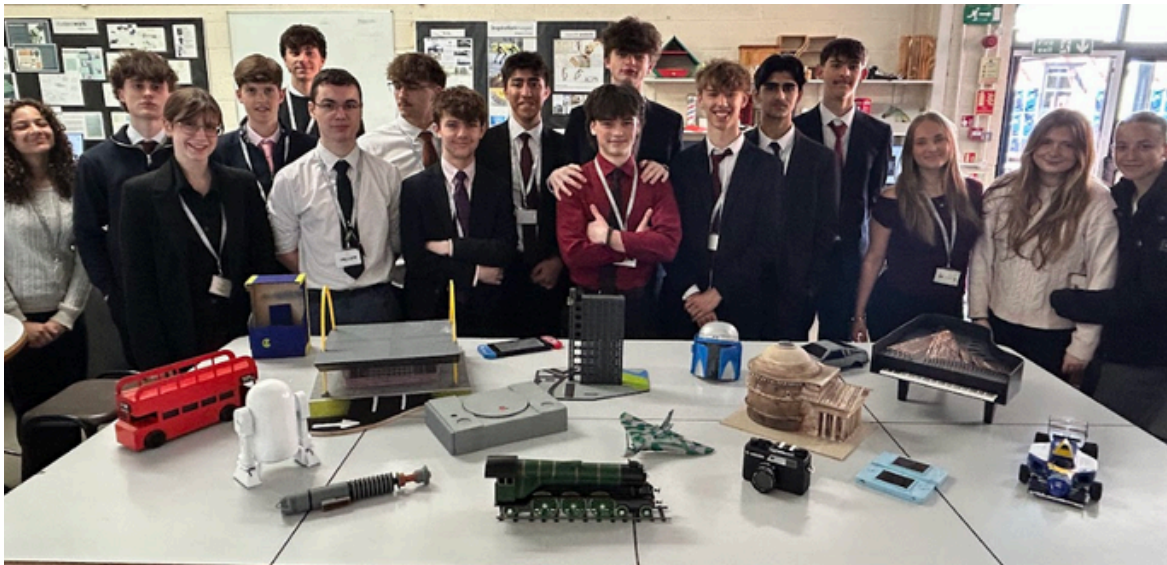

Alcester Grammar School has received an outstanding 31 offers for Medicine, Veterinary medicine and Dentistry with some universities still yet to respond. The current cohort includes individuals who have received a virtually unheard of clean sweep of offers from every university they applied to as well as UCAT (the university clinical aptitude test) results in the top 0.4% of the country.

This success is down to the hard work and determination of the AGS students as well as the comprehensive and extensive package of pre clinical training offered by the school. As well as outstanding teaching in all subjects supporting clinical applications AGS offers training on the UCAT admissions test from year 11 onwards, numerous supercurricular activities such as suturing workshops with Warwick medical school and trips to BCU and the Worcester medical museums as well as talks from admissions tutors and clinicians for all years. All of which are run through our thriving, student led medical society.

AGS also developed and leads Warwickshire's largest free medical mock interview event. The mock 'MMI' event this year saw 70 students from Alcester Grammar School, Stratford Girls Grammar School and King Edwards Grammar School interviewed by more than 55 clinicians ranging from consultants and researchers to professors, GPs, vets and dentists. Charles Gill, teacher in charge of clinical applications, said "We are immensely proud of all of our clinical applicants and delighted to have been able to offer a programme to support their clinical ambitions. We are equally pleased to be able to work with and support candidates from other local schools as part of our wider schools alliance. These superb results demonstrate that AGS is an outstanding place to study, particularly if you aspire to medicine."

A group of Year 8 students took part in the WSBA 2026 this year. They read six amazing titles, had book club meetings to discuss the books (and eat biscuits!) and also had a talk from Angela Edwards of the School Library Service about the books.

The students had fantastic and often passionate discussions about the books and their opinions of them. They also compiled a list of questions to ask the authors, as well as having the opportunity to enter additional competitions such as art, writing and a blog entry.

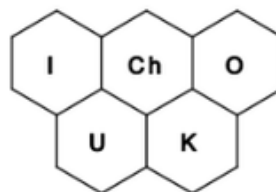

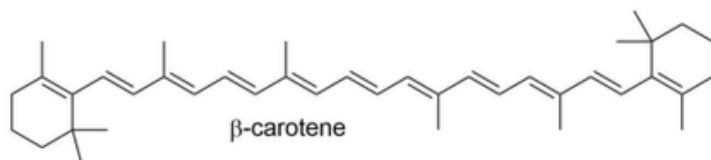
## 58th International Chemistry Olympiad 2026

Our Year 13 Chemistry students had the opportunity to take part in the RSC Chemistry Olympiad this year. It is a challenging competition which requires students to apply their knowledge to difficult questions based on current real-world chemistry problems.

Questions this year asked about the unpleasant odours caused by isocyanides, henna tattoos and the tartrazine food dye used to make Doritos yellow but which also makes mouse skin temporarily transparent.

### Q4 This question is about rice, spice, and mice

The national dish of Uzbekistan, host nation for the 2026 International Chemistry Olympiad, is called pilaf. Pilaf is a rice dish, typically containing lamb, carrots, and spices. Its characteristic colour comes from the carotene pigment found in carrots, which has several different isomers.



β-Carotene contains 40 carbon atoms, 11 C=C bonds, and two rings.

(a) Write the molecular formula for β-carotene.
